Our May chapter virtual meeting will be slightly off schedule, being on Tuesday, May 23, when we will be joined by Bill Nolan, owner and head guide of PA Troutfitters. Bill will talk with us about the trout fishing opportunities in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley area near Jim Thorpe and Allentown. Often overlooked by anglers headed east to the Delaware River or west to Spring Creek and beyond, the Lehigh Valley region is actually home to a wealth of healthy coldwater trout fisheries. Bill is the owner of PA Troutfitters, a local guiding and fly fishing instruction outfit located in Slatedale, PA. Come on out to hear Bill tell us about the opportunities to fish a less-explored part of our neighboring state.

Boating and Fishing Clinics - MD DNR

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources, Marine Trades Association of Maryland, Annapolis School of Seamanship, and the Boat U.S. Foundation are sponsoring free [“Welcome to Boating and Fishing”](#) clinics May 6-7 at [Sandy Point State Park’s](#) boating ramps.

New and returning boaters and anglers are invited to come learn from the pros at free seminars about boating and fishing and view demonstrations on boat launching and safety equipment. Attendees can learn skills to stay involved, be safe, and enjoy Maryland’s waterways.

In addition to free seminars and demonstrations, several classes are available for purchase from Annapolis School of Seamanship at a discounted cost. Space is limited for classes.

A variety of programs will take place each day between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. The full schedule is available on the Department of Natural Resources website and advanced registration is requested.

Some programs during the clinic have additional costs, and all attendees must also pay the park’s \$5 entry fee when they arrive. Sandy Point State Park information is available on the [DNR website](#).

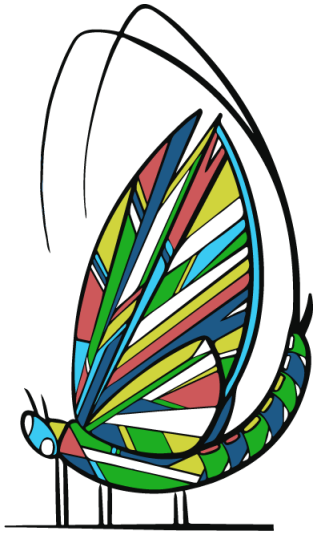
Free Outdoor Fly Fishing Experience for Kids!!

How to Behave on a Trout Stream - Orvis, Tom Rosenbauer

Spring is here and so are the crowds. Its early in the year yet there seems to be more people out fishing than ever before and we all need to get along! Learn how to make your experience, and that of others, more pleasant and productive with just a bit of communication.

A little common sense and etiquette goes a long way on today's crowded rivers. There are some ethics that you should follow in fly fishing. And they're really just basic, common sense, or the "golden rule".

Give other people their space on the water. Don't crowd other people. If you see somebody in the water, try to go somewhere else. Try to go upstream or downstream. Give people space, that's probably the most important thing you can do in fishing.

For those that have never used one, the New Zealand [Strike Indicator](#) is a great indicator for spooky fish and for highly technical water.

This super innovative and patented system will allow you to easily make and remove strike indicators. In less than 10 seconds you can be fishing. You can easily adjust the indicator so your fly is presented exactly in the trout's strike zone. You can also trim your indicator to different sizes to match conditions. If fish start rising, you can quickly remove the indicator within a couple seconds.

The indicator system come in different packages with multiple color options of yarn. Use as is or mix and match to create a unique indicator that you can see well on the water.



Fly Shop Spotlight – Beaver Creek Precision Fly and Tackle - PPTU

The Beaver Creek Fly Shop has been Hagerstown's premier fly fishing shop for a long time. Now owned by Precision Fly and Tackle, Beaver Creek is a full-service fly shop on the banks of Beaver Creek, a tremendous year-round wild trout fishery. Reforestation a Farm Field - PPTU via James Irons

Thanks to Jim for passing this along.

We recently had the CEO of the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay, Kate Fritz, speak at our chapter meeting. It was interesting to hear everything they do. If you missed the presentation, it was recorded and you can access it from the [PPTU](#) website.

So, here's the [Alliance in action!](#) The article paints a great picture of what the Alliance can accomplish. In November, 2021, the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay began reforestation 36 acres within the Emory Waters Nature Preserve at Jug Bay Wetlands Sanctuary. For decades, four different plots of land within the property were used to cultivate grain crops, and before that, likely grew tobacco. The nature preserve is named after Emory Waters, an African American man who once lived within Jug Bay and farmed the land.

Over time, it was decided that this land, which is owned by Anne Arundel County, would be better suited as forest than farmland. So, in October, 2021, the last crop was harvested and the reforestation effort began.



PPTU will be looking into a future project with the Alliance and hope to see many of our members show up as volunteers.

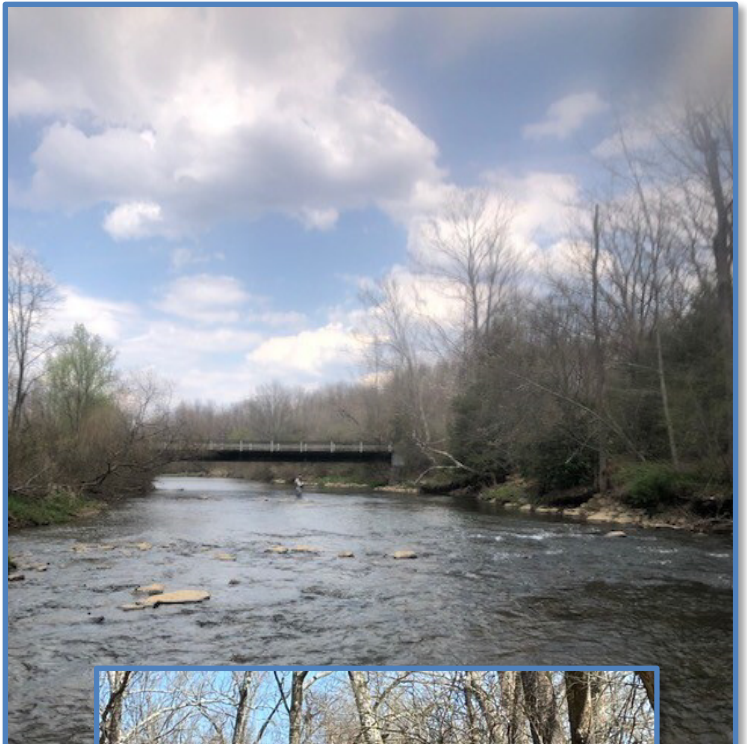

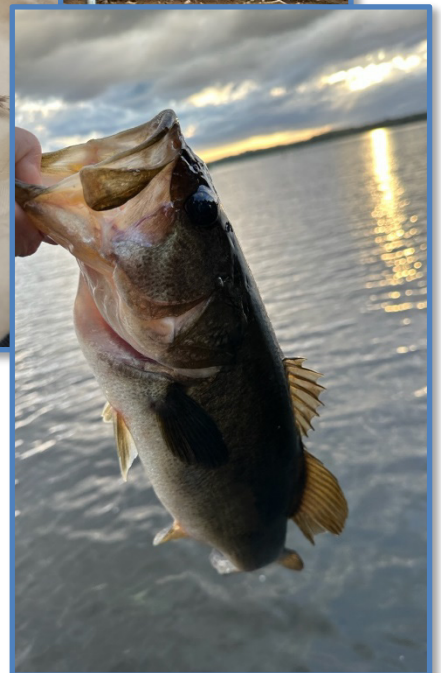


Members Catch - Bob O'Donnell

The photo of the 2 trout on a single fly says it all. The Clouser minnow is perhaps the best baitfish pattern of all time. It simply catches fish, in the case above – 2 fish! Incredible.

Tim Flagler of Tighline Productions walks you through this great fly. Clousers can also be tied small so you can fish them on your local trout streams.
