"Fishing Western Maryland's Savage River" Matt O'Neal **October 16th**, 2024

Our speaker for October is PPTU member, YouTube fly tyer and educator extraordinaire Matt O'Neal (@SavageFlies). Matt will be sharing his expertise on fishing one of Maryland's premiere trout streams the Savage River.

Matt grew up in the mountains of north Georgia. He attended college at The Citadel in South Carolina and then spent ten years as a Naval officer in Rhode Island, New York City, Norfolk, Monterey, Seattle and Washington, DC. He currently works for the Navy as the Public Affairs Officer of the Naval Surface Warfare Center in Indian Head, MD.

He began fly fishing in the 1980s with an old Cortland rod/reel combo from K-mart. Mostly targeting bass and panfish on the local farm ponds. He fished off and on for the next 20 years and after his stint in the Navy and moving back to Maryland, he picked it up for good and has been fishing as often as possible since about 2015.

In 2018 he and his wife bought a farm near Cumberland, MD. That it was near the Savage River was a happy coincidence! He considers the Savage his homewater and fishes it 20-30 times a year but spends plenty of time on the Gunpowder as well. He's lucky enough to get 2-3 fishing vacations a year where he'll make the trip down to the Great Smoky Mountains or the Catskills. His future plans are to



keep creating fly tying videos for Savage Flies until he can retire to his farm and hopefully start writing fly tying books. We hope to see many of you for this interesting and informative presentation by our own Matt O'Neal.

Fall Trout Stocking 2024 - Ray Miller

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is making changes to trout stocking in 2024 into 2025 in response to survey feedback from trout anglers and heat and drought-induced challenges faced at the hatcheries over the summer.

Fishing and Boating Services periodically surveys anglers to receive feedback on their preferences and opinions. Results from these surveys help guide our management approach and the services provided. A recent survey of Put and Take trout anglers suggested that many anglers would prefer to catch larger trout, even if they caught fewer trout overall.

In response, we will be implementing a number of changes to the trout stocking program:

For the fall of 2024, the hatcheries will stock approximately 3,000 brown trout and 12,000 rainbow trout. This represents a 30% decrease from 2023, but the trout will be larger, averaging slightly over a pound each.

Additional fish will be held from the fall to the spring of 2025 to increase the number of trout available in the spring and to allow for several more months of growth in the hatchery. Hatcheries staff are working to increase the number of trophy-sized trout stocked, mostly with trout in the three to four pound range.



DNR is also planning to stock more brown trout in the future. Anglers can look forward to approximately 12,000 brown trout during the spring 2025 season. An additional 2,000 "holdover" brown trout that will average about a pound each will be new for 2025.

<u>Fall trout stocking</u> will begin in early October as soon as water levels and temperatures are acceptable for trout.

How to Use the "Elimination Diet" to Catch Educated Trout - Evan Jones

Ever since moving back home to the Front Range of Colorado, I've been re-learning just how selective and "technical" some trout can become under constant fishing pressure. Their ability to pick out minute details is downright uncanny, even when you've achieved a drag-free drift. Some trout are so good at ignoring flies, anglers can get the impression they're only looking for one very specific thing which must be matched exactly in order to catch fish. In my experience, however, it's more likely that overly-picky trout have simply learned to focus on a few specific aspects of flies that help them to identify fakes from a mile away.

Figuring out which aspect(s) of your fly the trout are recognizing and rejecting can be tricky, especially since it can vary so much by location or seasonal timing, so using a consistent and replicable approach is important. In order to stay organized, I came up with a two-step system that I call the Elimination Diet, which has been remarkably effective. Here's how it works:

Step 1: Strip It Down

The first step is to distill your fly down to the bare essentials by removing beads, flash, wing cases, tails, legs, and all other "extras" that trout might be noticing and avoiding. The resulting "fly" is now just thread wrapped around a hook. (I add a black head with a marker, and seal the thread with clear nail polish.) This plain, slim pattern may not be the most accurate insect imitation, but at least it won't raise any suspicions. Try these stripped-down patterns in the same colors and sizes as the flies that were rejected, and see if the reaction is different.

If you still don't catch trout, then fly design might not be the issue, and the Elimination Diet might not be the solution.

However, if you do catch trout with the basic thread fly, then there's something about the more complex flies you were using earlier that the fish have apparently learned to avoid. Time for step 2.




Step 2: Build It Better

If you caught fish on the plain thread midge, you can start reintroducing design elements, one at a time, to test whether each one makes the fly more or less effective. So far, I've noticed that wing cases and tails rarely lead to fewer strikes, while flash is the cause of the most refusals, followed closely by brass bead heads. Your mileage may vary, but by testing each fly design element individually, you'll come to understand exactly what the fish in your area will tolerate, and maybe even what they prefer.
