Climate Corner

Earlier this summer the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) published a 2025 Climate Synthesis report. In a 27 August, 2025 statement entitled "The Practice and Assessment of Science: Five Foundational Flaws in the Department of Energy's 2025 Climate Report ", the American Meteorological Society (AMS) identified five foundational flaws in the report:

- 1) Lack of breadth across scientific fields.
- 2) Lack of depth within scientific fields and specific topics.
- 3) The DoE Report is based on an unrepresentative group of subject matter experts.
- 4) The DoE Report selectively emphasizes a small set of unrepresentative findings, particularly those that might appear beneficial on superficial examination. This "cherry picking" also downplays and excludes scientific findings that might be widely understood to be harmful.
- 5) The DoE Report extrapolates from a limited subset of findings to reach conclusions that do not follow from comprehensive consideration of the scientific evidence.

The AMS Statement ends with:

Five conclusions are robust when accounting comprehensively for the scientific evidence. They have been consistently reaffirmed by independent subject matter experts and independent scientific institutions worldwide. Decades of intensive research on climate change demonstrate that:

- 1) Climate is changing, and the rate and magnitude of change are unusual in human experience.
- 2) People are the primary cause of modern climate change, mostly through burning fossil fuels.
- 3) Climate change is harmful to humanity, and the threats to people and all life are increasing.
- 4) A wide range of response options is available that can reduce the dangers of climate change.
- 5) Those who study the scientific evidence overwhelmingly agree.

I Love Big Tippets- Jay Sheppard

I recently described the parachute and related casts. In that article I mentioned using long tippets for dry flies. I wish to expound a little more on this point to explain my reasons in more depth. A late friend and super fly fisher in another state once said there were five factors in catching wary trout. They were presentation, presentation, presentation, and fly selection, in that order!



Dead drifting a fly is not easy. On our heavily fished eastern streams, trout see hundreds of flies in a year, if not more. They can often identify the fly before they are 8" long and the hook manufacturer before they are 10". The trout constantly watch all the bubbles, debris and potential food drift by their station. They are quick learners. They are not going to come to the surface to take any item that does not move in the same manner as the bubbles and all other drifting material. So, presentation becomes the challenge for the dry fly angler.

Consider a hypothetical arrangement. One attaches a foot of 5x tippet directly to the tip of the fly line and then casts with no fly. The 5X will lie straight out from the end of the fly line. Now attach 9 or 10 feet instead. Where does the tip of this new 5X land in relation to the end of the fly line? If there is no wind, the tip of the 5X material may only be a foot or two from the tip of the fly line. The point is that long tippets do not unfurl very much. Add any fly and it cannot carry an

air-resistant fly even less. Anyone who has used a tandem dry fly rig quickly learns the trailing dry fly is rarely more than a foot from the larger fly regardless of the length of its tippet.

First, a monofilament tippet for dry flies should be of the same brand as the main tapered leader to avoid differences in flexibility and strength. Adding a stiffer or stronger tippet is not good. The tippet needs to be at least one size smaller and more than 10% weaker than the main leader but can be up to three times smaller (e.g., adding 7X to 4X). If more than 3 times smaller, just loop in a 5–10" segment of intermediate size (e.g., 5X looped between 3X leader and 8X tippet). The length and size of the tippet are based mostly upon the size of the fly; the wind may also be a factor. I generally use a tippet of about 30-45" for most dead drift presentations, 20–25" for small streamers, something in between for most nymphs and wets. In dealing with very fussy trout, I have used tippets up to 60" in length. The longer the tippet, the more drag free the presentations. Short tippets turn over more easily but are more likely to break than long ones, so they should be no shorter than 18-20" from their loop knot to the fly. Thus, for most dry fly fishing I am using a leader system that is 9½' to 10½' long, occasionally up to 12–13' and sometimes as short as 9'. I want my dry flies to drift exactly like the bubbles and naturals on the water. Long tippets give me an edge.

I usually use a 7½' tapered main leader. I loop tippets of varying sizes and lengths to this base all day long. For a more in-depth description of the loop-to-loop leader system I use, go to our Chapter website: Leaders Simplified. In the darkness of an evening hatch, there should only be three knots to be felt from the fly to the butt of the leader—anymore and you have a wind knot!

May all your dry flies drift like they are not attached to any tippet.

The Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will begin its annual fall trout stocking program the first full week in October. The program will bring thousands of hatchery-raised rainbow, brown, and golden rainbow trout to streams and impoundments across the state. This initiative provides recreational fishing opportunities for

anglers of all ages and skill levels throughout the autumn months.



Crews will stock 29 waterbodies with more than 15,000 brown, golden rainbow, and rainbow trout averaging just less than a pound each. Anglers should consult the Maryland Guide to Fishing and Crabbing or the DNR website for current fishing regulations. The waterbodies will be determined based on local conditions at the time of stocking. Daily updates with locations and numbers of trout stocked will be posted on DNR's trout stocking webpage and shared through email and social media.

Functional Fly Casting Part 1: Acceleration - Ed Jaworowski

It's vital to understand that, since fishing conditions and situations change endlessly, there can be no rigid or fixed rules or instructions for casting. You cannot specify where to start, move, or stop your arm or rod, or the direction and distance to move them, before deciding on the result you want from the cast. You must take various factors into account, including the fly being cast, the desired direction and distance, wind, any obstructions—whether overhead or to the side or rear—and more. Pink Beaded Rainbow Warrior - Lance Egan

The Rainbow Warrior was my first commercially available fly pattern. It's now over 20 years old! The first addition to the original was adding a tungsten beaded version (the original used a pearl glass bead). Next I made them in different colors. Red, black, and even an olive version existed at one time. Newer versions pop up routinely. During my competition fishing years I was constantly trying new flies, and I was being exposed to new ideas and tricks, one of which is wild colored beads. I found I didn't have consistent success with many bead colors outside of the standard gold, silver, copper, etc... with one exception. Metallic pink. Metallic pink beads work really well. Add that pink bead magic to an already deadly fly pattern and you have the Pink Beaded Rainbow Warrior. It's a great variation that is easy to tie and you likely already have most, if not all of the components if you tie Rainbow Warriors. Grab a pack of pink beads and some Wapsi rainbow sow scud dubbing and have your net readily accessible.




Tracking Practice - Mad River Outfitters
